Committee Positions:

	Chartered Organization Representative: The direct contact between the Troop and the Chartered Organization (the Reformed Church).
	Troop Committee Chairman: Supervises the Troop committee and Troop leaders.
	Troop Treasurer: Handles Troop funds, pay bills, and maintain accounts
$\overline{}$	Troop Advancement Chair: Ensures that the Troop has an effective advancement program, and is responsible for record keeping, obtaining recognition materials (badges, etc.) and submitting advancement reports.
	Troop Boards of Review: Chairs the Boards of Review for the Troop.
	Troop Secretary: Keeps minutes and records, send notices, and handle publicity.
	Troop Equipment Coordinator: Works with the youth Quartermaster and is responsible for inventory, storage, and maintenance of Troop equipment.
	Troop Outdoor/Activities Chair: Secures tour permits and permission to use camping site, serves as transportation coordinator, and ensures a monthly outdoor program.
	Troop Membership Chair: Ensures a smooth transition of new Scouts into the Troop and orientation for new parents.
	Troop Training Chair: Ensures training opportunities are available, maintains training records and materials, and ensures BSA Youth Protection training is completed.
	Troop Public Relations Chair: Provides news and announcements about the Troop to newspapers, bulletins of sponsors, web sites, etc.
As	sistant Scoutmasters:
	Assistant Scoutmasters assist the Scoutmaster in leading the scouts, providing skills instruction, adult assistance with delivering the troop program, providing two-deep leadership at troop events (camping, hiking, etc.) and may be assigned to one or more patrols. Duties may overlap or assist with roles in the Troop Committee. If you think you can help in any of the specific areas below, please check the appropriate box(es).
	New-Scout patrol. Works with the Troop Guide and New-Scout Patrol Leader to help lead the new scouts.
	Cub Scout outreach. Works with the Den Chief(s) to maintain a relationship with the Cub Scouts and help with Webelos to Boy Scout transition.
	Service. Helps lead the Troop's service activities.
	Administration. Assists with records and materials, maintaining the Troop database
	Advancement. Works with the Scouts to help them with advancement.
	Outdoor skills. Helps the Scouts develop outdoor skills.
	Camping Trips. Helps to plan, organize, and lead camping and hiking trips.
	Troop Meetings. Helps the Patrol Leaders Council to plan and organize Troop meetings.

Merit badge counselors teach skills and/or sign-off when a boys has fulfilled the requirements for a badge. Counselors may also be Committee Members and Assistant Scoutmasters, but don't have to be either. They just have to have a working knowledge of the subject and be willing to help.
